

Day#1: Departure for Italy

Saturday: June 8th, 2013

In conjunction with Jetaway Travel, Keyrow Tours is pleased to make all flight arrangements, including primary flights originating from anywhere in the United States. Together as a group we will internationally depart from a major airport on the East Coast of the United States, usually Philadelphia, New York or Washington DC. Transportation to and from your airport of departure is each person's responsibility.

Day #2: "From Pagan Temples to Patrimonial Churches"

Sunday: June 9th, 2013

Morning Arrival at Leonardo Da Vinci Airport, Rome Italy

After collecting our luggage and going through customs, a private minivan will take us to Hotel Smeraldo, located in the historic center of Rome. The ride is pleasantly under half an hour. Hotel check-in time is usually around noon. We will drop off our bags, have a cappuccino, and enjoy a brief orientation to the neighborhood. After check-in we will have time to shower and unpack.

The Centro Storico (Historic Center)

A.) Campo Dei Fiori

This is Rome's daily farmer's market. Just 5 minutes away from our hotel, enjoy the sights and sounds of people wheeling and dealing in produce from both land and sea: Fresh veggies, fruits, cheese, meats and fish.

B.) Piazza Navona

One of Rome's most magnificent piazzas, or squares. See Bernini's famous Fountain of Four Rivers. Once the site of an ancient charioteer stadium, today it is a romantic location filled with artists, gelato ice cream shops, restaurants, and a variety of public performers.

Pranzo (Included Lunch)

C.) Church of San Luigi Francese

See three priceless Caravaggio paintings depicting scenes from the life of St. Matthew.

D.) The Pantheon

The best-preserved monument of ancient Rome which outdates Christianity! Once the site where Romans worshiped all the gods, today it is a beautiful Christian basilica.

E.) Church of Santa Maria Sopra Minerva

This church is built over a pagan temple to the goddess Minerva. See "The Resurrected Christ," a marble statue by Michelangelo. Visit the tomb of St. Catherine of Sienna, as well as that of Fra Angelico...the same monk who made the liquor? Cheers!

Day #3: Treasures of the Vatican

Monday: June 10th, 2013

Continental Breakfast

A.) Scavi Tour

This exclusive trip is not open to the general public. Two stories beneath St. Peter's basilica, we will visit a 2nd century Pagan necropolis. Many wonderful Roman and early Christian glimpses into the past. The highlight is standing 5 feet away from the final resting-place of St. Peter himself. *Permission to attend this exclusive tour, not open to the general public, is dependent on Vatican permission...*

B.) St. Peter's Basilica

Paul will give a one hour tour of St. Peter's Basilica, originally built in the 4th century by the Emperor Constantine. See Michelangelo's *Pieta*, a significant number of other masterpieces, the body of Pope John XXIII, and the tombs of many Popes.

C.) San Clemente

Excellent archaeological tour: a 12th century church, on top of a 10th century Church, on top of a 4th century Church, on top of 1st century Roman pagan apartment buildings, including a Mythric Temple. See it all, including some of the best mosaic artwork in Rome.

PRANZO (Lunch!)

D.) The Coliseum

Gladiator fighting, anyone? Visit the greatest monument of ancient Rome, and the bloodiest. Built in the 2nd century AD, the Flavian Amphitheatre seated 50,000 spectators and featured games pitting man against man, and man against wild beasts from around the known world.

E.) The Roman Forum

Visit Rome's ancient ruins, including the Senate Building, the temples of Saturn, Jupiter, the Vestals, and Julius Caesar.

Day #4: A Peace of Assisi

Tuesday: June 11th, 2013

Continental Breakfast

Morning Departure for Assisi by Train

The train ride to Assisi is pleasantly two hours. We will enjoy the beautiful countryside of the Umbrian Region, famous for its olive orchards and rolling hills. As a medieval city, Assisi stands frozen in time and is set high on top of a hill. As the birth place of St. Francis of Assisi, the Franciscan history of this place permeates every narrow cobblestone road and piazza. *Pack a light lunch for the train ride*...

Upon our arrival, a private vehicle will bring us outside the medieval walled city of Assisi and into the very heart of the Umbrian countryside. We are staying at the *Agriturismo Malvarina*... an incredibly scenic and beautiful farm that produces 70% of all organic products served in their dining room. In addition, the farm is entirely powered by solar panels and breeds chickens, rabbits, lambs, sheep, and turkeys. It also produces olive oil, vegetables, honey, jams and truffles. Mastro Giorgio, an expert cheese maker and meat curer, helps the Fabrizi family produce their cold cuts and pecorino cheese in the traditional Umbrian way. Tomorrow our host family will uncover their secrets to traditional epicurean cooking delights during a hands-on cooking class, after which we will share dinner in this Umbrian oasis. Truly off the beaten path, this Agriturismo experience will be an unforgettable treasure. After check-in, we will visit sites in the old walled city of Assisi that include:

- A.) The House of St. Francis' family, including the prison cell where Francis was locked-up by his irate father. (Ah, medieval parenting!)
- B.) The gothic Basilica of St. Clare which houses the San Damiano Cross.
- C.) Piazza Communale: Sit outdoors and drink vino or a café in Italy!
- D.) An ancient Mythric Temple that predates Christianity, but which Christianity has now embraced.
- E.) The Basilica of St. Francis (4:30 PM)

Day #5: Vistas of Umbria

Wednesday: June 12th, 2013

Continental Breakfast

A.) Assisi's Cathedral of San Ruffino

In essence, this is where St. Francis' and St. Clare's spiritual journey began. See the baptism font where both saints were welcomed into the life of the Church. See a portion of the house where St. Clare grew up as a child. Enjoy some quiet time in the Cathedral's baroque side chapel.

B.) Panoramic View

From San Rufino take a pleasant hike outside of Assisi's city walls for an amazing panoramic view of the surrounding Umbrian hillsides.

C.) The Rocca Maggiore Castle of Assisi

The Rocca Maggiore Castel stands high above all of Assisi, commanding a superb view of the valleys and hills below.

PRANZO! (Optional Light Lunch)

D.) Free Afternoon to Tour the Shops

Assisi, and Umbria in general, is famous for its pottery, linens, and fine olive oil. There are dozens of small shops in Assisi which sell these items, and store owners will happily ship your purchases back to the United States in one piece.

Thursday: June 13th, 2013

Morning Train Departure for Florence

Pranzo! (Light Lunch after hotel check-in)

A.) The Ponte Vecchio

Ponte Vecchio literally means, "The Old Bridge." This historic bridge that crosses the Arno River is laden with gold and diamond shops. Conveniently located just around the corner from our hotel, ladies...this one's for you!

B.) Piazza Signoria

This is Florence's central square. See the Palazzo Signoria (Florence's City Hall since the reign of the Medici's), the outdoor Loggia which contains ancient Roman and Greek statuary, as well as Celini's famous bronze of Persius holding Medusa's severed head.

C.) Santa Croce Church

This wonderful medieval church is the final resting-place of Michelangelo, Leonardo DaVinci, Machiavelli, Galileo, Rossini, and many others.

D.) The Mercato Nuovo

Florence has two excellent outdoor markets, and the Mercato Nuovo is extremely close to our hotel. Beautiful leather goods: jackets, wallets, purses, gloves, and so much more. It's fun to wander through, even if you're not interested in buying things.

Friday: June 14th, 2013

Continental Breakfast

The Accademia Museum

Enjoy Michelangelo's monolithic and statue of David, from the Old Testament hall of fame. Also enjoy his famous series of "Prisoners" designed for the tomb of Pope Julius II in Rome.

San Lorenzo Farmer's Market Tour

The San Lorenzo Mercato Centrale is the central market in Florence for fresh, local foods. Most likely you will see foods that you've never seen in a U.S. market before, like cow stomachs at the *Tripperia*. There are stands selling all kinds of fowl, meats (such as wild boar), fish, cheese, fruits and vegetables. Also of interest are shops selling local Tuscan products such as wine, biscotti, prosciutto and salami.

The San Lorenzo Outdoor Shopping Market

Packed with stalls selling everything from marbleized paper products, to leather goods, jewelry and pottery, the San Lorenzo outdoor market is an exciting place to explore, people watch, and (of course) shop...

Duomo Cathedral

Built in the Middle Ages, the original architects left it uncompleted in a sheer act of faith: A huge hole in its roof awaited a dome long before the technology existed to span such a distance. *No Problema!* Brunelleschi's dome eventually completed the structure, and became Michelangelo's model for St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican and the model for the future U.S. Capitol as well.

Tuscan Cooking Class, Dinner and Gelato Making Demonstration in Private Tuscan Villa

Tonight we participate in hands-on cooking class outside the city of Florence in a private Tuscan Villa. Paolo has been friends with Roberto's family for many years, and they are pleased to host our party. Brace yourself for an incredible experience: a hands-on cooking class that will culminate in a multi-coursed Italian feast that features homemade pasta, local meats, potatoes roasted in an outdoor oven, and Roberto's famous gelato which he will make before our eyes.

A.) World War II American Cemetery

Just outside of Florence, we will offer our respects to over 4,000 American service men and women who paid the ultimate price during the Second World War. Among the fallen are five brothers.

B.) Departure for Cheese Production

When it comes to the food meccas of the world, Tuscany is hard to overlook. For years, Italy has been known as one of the top food and wine destinations in the world. At the forefront of Italy's cuisine has been the region of Tuscany, one of the top cheese destinations in the world. Today we provide an insider's look into local cheese and cheese production, as a highly revered part of Italy. There are several predominant types of Tuscany cheeses, including ricotta, goat, raviggiolo, caciotta, and pecorino.

C.) Depart for the Tenuta Torciano Wine Tasting School

Tenuta Torciano is about 30 minutes away, and has been producing wine and olive oil since 1720. Featuring panoramic views with hillsides, vineyards, and olive groves, sip wine in the heart of Tuscany or simply live in the moment. Pierluigi is the vineyard owner, and he will offer us an in depth explanation of his wines, how they are made, and the science of wine tasting and wine pairing. His mother will prepare an incredible luncheon for us using only local and organic foods. Bravissima!!!

D.) Departure for San Gimignano

This is called the "Manhattan of Tuscany," because of its many medieval towers that look like skyscrapers from a distance. 15 minutes from Tenuta Torciano, this is a charming little town. Visit its central square, stroll into numerous shops, or dare to walk into the Medieval Torture Museum...We will have an hour or so to enjoy this little gem in the heart of Tuscany. Hey, sample some wild boar meat while you're here!

Take the day off to relax on the beach. Explore Positano's beauty, or...


Visit the Neighboring City of Amalfi (Optional Morning Excursion)

Day #12: Mt. Vesuvius, Pompeii and Rome

Wednesday: June 19th, 2013

Continental Breakfast

Morning Hotel Departure

A.) The Ruins of Pompeii

A private mini-van will take us to Pompeii, which was first occupied in the 8th century BC. A local guide will explain how the Etruscans first dominated the surrounding region, followed by the Saminites who turned Pompeii into a Greek town. Finally the Romans gained control over Pompeii until its end, that fateful day in 79 AD when Mt. Vesuvius unleashed its fury on the 20,000 inhabitants of this thriving Roman city.

Although this tragic event ended the lives of 20,000 Pompeian residents, the ash that buried the town served as a sort of *mummification* for the entire city. Under the ash everything remained as it was at the time of the eruption: Artwork was preserved. Buildings were preserved. Several important clues were left behind. These clues give us a glimpse into the past and capture a special moment in time.

Pranzo (Optional Picnic Lunch)

The food in Pompeii is in Paolo's opinion, less than appetizing. In the midst of the tourist trap tables, a lovely picnic lunch will magically appear. (OK, Paolo will arrange the picnic with our hotel's restaurant in Positano.) Bravissimo!


